The *Choral Belles* have become a Christmas Tradition at Trinity and will provide a beautiful evening of sacred and secular Christmas music. The traditional favorite carols of this joyous season will make you want to sing along with the Chorale – and they just might invite you to do so!

The *Choral Belles* have entertained Olympic, Quimper & Kitsap Peninsula audiences for the past 16 years, traveling between Bremerton, Port Townsend and Sequim. The group of 28 women has a goal of providing a community service through music and just plain having fun! During the Holiday season the Belles make an effort to perform at local Retirement Homes for those individuals that can’t get out to other performances. Most all of the members continue their singing avocation that began in their childhood singing with Church Choirs and School Chorales. Some of the group members have had formal voice training as well as instrument training and a few have trained with their Director, **Mary Lou Montgomery**.

Mary Lou has been a resident of Jefferson County since 1954. She attended Western Washington College of Education, majoring in Ele-

mentary Music and Choral. She held the position of Vocal Music Director at Chimacum High School for 16 years. Mary Lou is still active in music education and continues to teach wind instruments to local students. In addition to directing the *Choral Belles*, Mary Lou continues her love of music through singing and playing the alto saxophone with the New Orleans style *Dukes of Dabob* and the swing band *Nostalgia*. In her spare time, she is the Choir Director of the early service at the Lutheran Church of the Redeemer in Port Hadlock.

The *Choral Belles* Christmas Program will include favorite carols such as “**Caroling**”, “**Jesu Bambino**”, “**Hush**” and “**African Noël**” along with a couple of twists on the classics that should entertain all. The program will be well rounded. A musical interlude will be a solo by **Shirley Calkins** and **Sharon England**. The program will be accompanied on piano by **Jolene Visser** and flautist **Sandy Curtiss**.

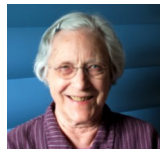
In December we will submit a comprehensive report which will incorporate the results of this latest question and the previ-

He made sure that every one of us had a firm grasp of the subject and ran us through endless spelling tests. Lucky for me, I turned out to like spelling, (not Math!) so this was easy for me. We got along famously, and he encouraged my writing assignments. It was a lesson in doing a job well.

There were family troubles at this time in my life, and so perhaps he did fill that role of the kindly uncle. Whatever it was, I've not forgotten him. I appreciated this background when I went on to work as a secretary in book publishing and other jobs. The only problem is, I can usually spot a spelling mistake in whatever I read, and it seems like there are more of them all the time! (Let's see, is that "usually can" or "can usually"?)

Memories of Harry

Harry Takata was there at **Carlyn Stark's** house in early August, 2003, when I drove up in a big rental truck at the end of a long drive from Philadelphia, PA. It was loaded with all the bits and pieces that made up the Mudler organ. In response to a request for space to repair and assemble it, Carlyn generously made available two large spaces in her garage. A lot of folks from the church were waiting for the truck to arrive and help unload.

When **Beth** and I picked up the truck in Philadelphia it was already loaded and ready to go as requested. It was a big surprise to all of us when the door was rolled up to reveal the load. Basically it was a giant sized puzzle with hundreds of parts and pieces but without the picture of how they fitted together. We had a decision to make!

After a couple of minutes consultation, the engineers (Harry and Stan) decided to segregate the items into categories: All the varnished cabinetry pieces were leaned against the walls, all the boxes of pipes were arranged on the floor and all other boxes and larger items were placed on top of the pipe boxes or stood up by themselves. There were some really odd looking items among them, one looked like a square-ended duck boat while the other looked like a large fish skeleton with floppy wooden ribs attached to a backbone. It turned out that this sort of puzzle was just the sort of thing that intrigued Harry. After the garage doors were closed we looked at each other and wondered just what we had gotten ourselves into.

Harry and I spent a considerable amount of time out at Carlyn's Port Hadlock place trying to make sense of all these parts. Keep in mind, we were trained in the 20th century and were used to dealing with machines made with nuts, bolts and steel or some other metal. Here we were faced with a complex wooden machine that used little metal anywhere except the pipes and that flexible joints and seals were made from leather. These facts changed our thinking about how to handle the job. It was obvious that after 100 years the leather was in bad shape and in need of replacement and some of the wooden parts were well worn or broken. We decided then and

there that all parts and assemblies would be inspected and repaired as necessary and that all leather would be replaced.

Harry and I got to know each other well during the process. After working on the project he would go home and look things up on the internet that would then provide guidance for some part of the work. His skills in doing the searching and finding were invaluable.

People came to visit to see what the inmates were up to and to make "helpful" suggestions, such as wondering out loud how we were ever going to get this collection of parts to play music. In the process one name came up more than once; it was about this retired veterinarian who lived down the Beaver Valley road, who had a large organ that he was working on. We were at the point where we needed some expert help so after arranging an introduction, Harry and I drove down there to get some advice. Dr. Schladetsky graciously showed us around including a tour inside this very large theater organ answering our questions as we went. At the end of the tour we came upon a man seated at a table working on an elaborate reed pipe. It was **Clint Meadway** who was introduced as the technical expert on this organ. This chance meeting changed our project fundamentally and made it a success!

Clint agreed to come and visit us in Trinity's basement where we had moved some of the parts that needed leatherwork or other detailed repairs. He was pleased with what we had done so far and went on to explain how to proceed. In particular we learned how to select the leather needed for the repairs and he showed us how to install it with the appropriate type of glue.

We beavered on through the winter, making progress with help from others. I found that Harry could be depended upon to carry out whatever task he was responsible for and do it right and do it meticulously. Beth remarked at the time that we both worked away without much talk and we were like two kids at parallel play. During this time we became more and more confident about the project. We reviewed what had been accomplished and what should be done next. It was then that I got to know Harry better. We talked about our

fathers and how we had interacted with them. I particularly liked the story he told about his father obtaining a maintenance handbook for the Model T Ford in Japanese which he studied carefully so that he could fix the family tractors and vehicles on the farm in California.

Harry was very kind and he soon found out that I had a sweet tooth, appreciating in particular the special treats that Alice sent along. He talked about her and how she had saved his life by insisting that he go and get medical treatment instead of toughing it out as guys are wont to do. Eventually, with a lot of help from others in preparing the site in the sanctuary, all the parts were brought together and assembled into the organ you see today. At that point we found out that the "duck boat" when upside down actually was the roof of the swell box. The organ was checked out and various adjustments were made allowing it to have its first piece of music played on it. It was July 1, 2004 and the biggest task was done. We were both happily surprised how well it turned out.

Harry's participation was fundamental in making the project a success that others can now enjoy. The dedication plaque on the organ especially recognizes Harry's significant contribution to its completion. It was one of the most enjoyable projects that I have ever worked on due to Harry's participation. He was a great friend and a first class engineer. I miss him greatly.

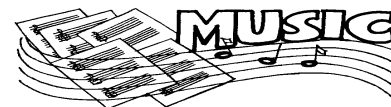
